

Safety Officer's Report By P/C Jerry Wise, SN

Do you really need those two back straps when towing your boat?

On the daily commute this week a spectacle presented itself that I haven't seen before. A beautiful nearly new 25-foot plus center console boat lay just ahead in a ditch just off the highway. The trailer and tow vehicle were in the road and looking normal but the majority of the boat was in the ditch with the bow still attached to the winch stand. The tow vehicle had just turned off the highway onto a secondary road when the boat slid sideways off the trailer.

Boats are designed to be trailered secured in the front by the winch stand and possibly a tie down chain to the frame. Most modern trailers have tie down points for straps going to secure points on the rear of the boat. These straps are often the most forgotten tie down points after a boat has been used for a number of years. Next to leaving out the drain plug, not using these is probably the most neglected procedure in preparing a boat for transport.

Most of us don't trailer a boat that often so we need to be extra careful in attention to detail. Here is a check list to make sure you are safe on the road:

- A lock through the trailer lock lever on the tow ball is a good method of assuring it is locked down and secured when ready to tow. (I take the lock and put it on the drivers seat when hooking up a trailer as a reminder.) Prevent trailer theft by locking the trailer lever even when the boat isn't attached.
- ☑ Attach the rear boat straps to the trailer and check that they are properly adjusted before going on the highway.
- ☑ Make sure your boat is centered on the trailer and that any fuel and gear are distributed evenly as an uneven load can cause instability. It also makes steering and maneuvering much more difficult.
- ☑ Tie down all loose items and equipment in and on your boat.
- ☑ Criss cross your chains under the frame when attaching the trailer to the towing vehicle. The chains must be able to support the weight of the entire load, which is critical if the hitch should break.
- ☑ Check to make sure that the trailer brake lights and directional lights are all working. That way other drivers will know when you're stopping, braking or turning.
- ☑ Check the tire pressure and ensure the lug nuts are tight and secure.
- ☑ Adjust your side view mirrors so that you can get a clear view of the trailer and traffic behind you.
- Practice turning and backing up with the trailer attached. It takes time to get used to these maneuvers, so it's important to practice, gaining expertise and confidence.
- $\ensuremath{\square}$ Use additional straps to tie down the boat to the trailer frame.

Tips for Towed Sports

The summer is in full swing, which makes the topic of our safety message today even more urgent – Towed Sports Safety. As our waterways become crowded during this time of year, it is vital to identify and implement important measures for safely water skiing, wake boarding, knee boarding, wake surfing, and tubing.



Videos like this one underscore the need for safety considerations when participating in towed sports.

Did you know that according to the Coast Guard, towed water sports account for over 400 boating incidents per year. And let's not forget your life jacket when you're out having fun on the water. In addition to a properly fitted life jacket, get one designed for the type of towed sport you are enjoying.

These measures are presented in the "<u>Towed Sports Safety</u>" video where viewers learn about proper equipment selection and preparing to tow a person.

For instance:

- Tube ropes should be around 60 feet long and heavier than water ski and wake board ropes that should be about 75 feet long
- Ski ropes should have more give than wake board ropes
- Wear your life jacket when you are out having fun on the water and make sure it is properly fitted and designed for the type of towed sport you are enjoying
- The video features additional tips for operating underway

For other safe boating videos visit <u>Americas Boating Channel</u> which are an excellent tool to help recruit participants to our educational program and to membership. Invite your friends and neighbors to watch, like and subscribe to America's Boating Channel to introduce them to what our organization has to offer.

In addition to <u>YouTube</u>, these professionally produced high-definition safe boating and boater education videos are available via the America's Boating Channel free, on-demand app on Apple TV, Roku or FireTV. America's Boating Channel TM is produced by the United States Power Squadrons ® (USPS) under a grant from the Sport Fish Restoration and Boating Trust Fund administered by the U.S. Coast Guard.


Cooper River Cruise, June 7-9

After an island clean up day, 24 members enjoyed watching the Dam Boat Run, a cruise to Na'Cho Margarita at Martin's Landing and a raft up!










4th of July and Pig Roast, June 29

After a few broken ribs, emergency surgery, a few days in the hospital and recovery time at home, Donnie has made an excellent recovery.

"How do you repay someone for saving your life? God used them in a way that is nothing short of a miracle. A few more seconds and I wouldn't be here." Donnie said.

And that is how friendship and chance saved a life.
